

WHAT ARE THE TROOP DUES?

Scouts

- \$66 Scout registration fee is due in October for the following year
 - This fee is paid to BSA as part of the recharter process
 - o If your scout chooses to have a Scout Life magazine subscription it's \$12 more
 - \$25 Join Fee if your new to Scouts BSA
- \$35 Troop Dues are due in March
 - Dues are used first to purchase/refurbish Troop equipment

Adults Leaders

- \$48 Adult registration fee is due in October only to registered adults and applies to the following year
 - This fee is paid to BSA as part of the recharter process

 - Name badges are approximately \$10
 - depending on how many are ordered when the next order is placed

BASICS **DUTDOOR FOOTWEAR**

Outdoor footwear jargon can be confusing!

Most hiking boots and shoes fall into three basic categories:



Backpacking Boots

High-cut with better balance and ankle support, designed to carry heavier loads on multi-day trips. Stiffer mid soles than lighter footwear



Hiking Boots

Mid-cut models flex easily and require little break-in time, but lack the ankle support, debris protection, and durability of stouter backpacking



Walking Shoes

Low-cut models with flexible mid soles are excellent for day hiking or camping. They provide less rollresistance for ankles are more vulnerable to dirt, sand or mud



Socks Liner socks are thin socks worn next to the skin under other socks. Liners wick sweat away and limit blister-causing abrasion between

Keeping Feet Dry

Wet feet are more prone to blisters. During rest breaks and in camp remove your boots and air out your feet. In warm weather waterproof boots may make feet hot and sweaty because they are not as breathable. Synthetic or woo socks dry quickly and hold moisture away from



Stiffer soled boots and shoes lend stability and comfort to long hikes on rocky, uneven terrain. When testing boots stand on an uneven surface. If you feel each bump the boot is probably not stiff enough to protect your feet.

First Aid Kit & Bug Repellent

- Six adhesive bandages
- Two 3x3 sterile gauze pads
- One small adhesive tape roll
- One small antibiotic tube
- One CPR breath barrier
- Bug repellent
- One pair non-latex disposable gloves
- *female scouts* feminine hygiene products

Rain Gear

- Jackets are functional with pockets
- Ponchos cover scout and daypack
- Rain pants

Extra Clothing & Paracord

- Socks, T-shirt, shorts "got soaked" replacements
- 50' MIL-SPEC 550 Paracord

Hydration

Water bottle/bladder

Sun Protection

- Sunscreen for skin and lips
- Hat/clothing

Illumination

- Headlamp & extra batteries
 - Cheap headlights are not durable and will not last
 - Entry-level headlamps are \$20-\$25
 - o Red or green or blue secondary light
- Flashlight & extra batteries
 - Cheap headlights aren't durable and will not last

o +350 lumens

Trail Food

- Mix of dry quick energy items and proteins
- Compact, high energy foods unlikely to spoil
- Re-sealable container for easier snacking

Fire Starters


- Waterproof Matches in waterproof container
- Flint & Steel
- Carry several types of fire starters in case one fails

Navigation

- Topographic map/assorted maps in waterproof container
- Magnetic compass
- Optional Altimeter or GPS receiver

How Do Troop Elections Work?

- Troop Elections are held every six months
 - In September and March
- Scouts investigate positions of interest before elections
 - Review the Troop 870 Position Guide on the Troop Website for position description, qualifications and requirements
 - o Talk to the current position holder and the Scoutmaster to learn more about the position
- On election night:
 - Scouts speak about their interest in a position, their qualifications and what they will do if elected
 - Scouts then vote for the position via paper ballot
 - Scouts can run for multiple positions during the elections

WHAT ARE THE SCOUT RANKS?

LEARNING

- Scout Rank
 - o Introduction to Boy Scouts. Can be achieved very quickly
- Tenderfoot, Second Class, First Class
 - Focused on outdoor skills
 - o Achieving the First Class rank is an important achievement
 - · Means the Scout has demonstrated the skills needed to be successful in the outdoors

TEACHING

- Star, Life, Eagle
 - Focused on leadership development
 - Requires serving as a Troop Leader, participating in service projects and earning merit badges
 - The Eagle rank requires completion of an Eagle Project.
 - Must be completed before turning 18 years old

How Does A Scout Get A Requirement Signed-Off?

- The requirements for each rank are fully described in the Scout Handbook
 - And bullet pointed in ScoutBook for reference
- Scout requirements are covered:
 - o At Troop Meetings, Summer Camp and other outings
 - o On a Scout's own initiative. Ask senior Scout or ASM/SM for help.
- To get a requirement signed off:
 - o Scout approaches a senior Scout (Star rank or higher) or ASM/SM. Parents cannot sign-off requirements.
 - Demonstrates they have the knowledge to meet the requirement
 - o If they meet the requirement, the requirement will be initialed and dated in the book
 - If they don't, the person will explain what they need to do to meet the requirement
- If the sign-off process with a Scout doesn't work, please let an SM/ASM know
 - o Sometimes the senior Scouts need a refresher course in signing off requirements

How Does A Scout Earn A Merit Badge?

- Merit Badges can be earned by:
 - Taking Merit Badge classes at Summer Camp
 - Scouts can comfortably earn 3 or more Merit Badges at Summer Camp
 - Taking district Merit Badge classes
 - Advancement Chair sends out periodic notices of upcoming classes

- Working with a Merit Badge Counselor on a specific Merit Badge
 - A parent can be a MBC for their son for up to five non-Eagle required Merit Badges
- To work with a Merit Badge Counselor (MBC):
 - Merit Badge Chair can help find a MBC for your son
- For more information on a particular Merit Badge:
 - Check out the Merit Badge book from the Troop Library or buy it from the Scout Shop
 - Go to www.meritbadge.org for more information

What is a Scoutmaster Conference and Board Of Review?

Scoutmaster Conference

- Arranged by Scout with Scoutmaster ahead of time
- Scoutmaster discusses with Scout:
 - What the Scout has done and learned as part of the rank
 - The Scout's perspective on their Patrol, the Troop and Scouting in general
 - The Scout's goals for future rank advancement and participation in the Troop

Board of Review

- Arranged by Advancement Chair with three Troop 870 adults ahead of time
 - o Adult cannot be a parent, Scoutmaster or Assistant Scoutmaster.
- Covers the same topics as the Scoutmaster Conference
- A Board of Review is NOT a retest of the requirements
 - Scouts are encouraged, but not required to demonstrate what they learned

What Is A Court Of Honor?

• The Court Of Honor is a special Troop event where:

- Scouts are recognized for advancing rank, earning Merit Badges, serving in a leadership position and other achievements
- Adults are recognized for their contribution
- o A dessert potluck is served
- Court Of Honors are held in Sept and March

Please bring your families!

How Do Scout Accounts Work?

- A Scout Account is the equivalent of a bank account
- Money earned from fundraisers is put in the Scout Account
- The Scout Account can be used for
 - Yearly dues-Automatically deducted
 - Activity fees-Automatically deducted
 - Buying Scout equipment
- Provide a receipt to Treasurer for reimbursement
- Due to non-profit rules, Scout Accounts cannot be cashed out
- Contact Treasurer for current Scout Account balance

WHAT FUNDRAISING OPPORTUNITIES ARE THERE?

The Tree Crunch is the main Troop fundraiser

- Create door flyers in November
- Distribute to local neighborhoods in December
- Pick-up trees in January
- 81% of profit goes to Scouts on the basis of hours worked

Wreath Sales

- Begins in October and ends in November
- 100% of profit goes to Scouts

Plant Sales

- Begins in February and ends in April
- 100% of profit goes to Scouts

WHAT HAPPENS AT SUMMER CAMP?

- The highlight of each Scout year is often Summer Camp
- 80%+ of the Troop's Scouts typically attend Summer Camp
- At Summer Camp, Scouts
 - Have fun (Hike, Swim, Climb, Shoot, etc.)
 - Earn 3-4 Merit Badges at each Summer Camp, typically
 - Work on "Trail To First Class" requirements
- Troop Adults work with the Scouts on requirements selected by the Scouts
- Help your scout come up with a fun and sensible plan for Summer Camp
- Troops 870/5870 believe all Scouts should have the opportunity to go to Summer Camp
- Financial Aid is available to new scouts who did not have an opportunity to participate in the Fall and Winter Fundraisers.
- Contact Treasurer for more info

How Can I Help?

- Participate in Scout Board Of Reviews
 - Conducted by at least three registered adults (can't be for your own scout)
- See Board Of Review Guide on the Troop Website for more information at: www.BeavertonTroop870.org > Organization > Documents > Troop
- Lead or Co-Lead an activity

- An experienced leader will mentor you through the process
- Be a Merit Badge Counselor, Assistant Scoutmaster, or Troop Committee Member
- Any parent who wants to drive another scout to an event or attend an overnight activity needs to have a current Youth Protection Training certificate (YPT)

Shoulder Epaulets

☐ Green shoulder loops identify Scouts BSA participants (all members of a troop). 5 pts.

Right Sleeve

 U.S. flag emblem centered directly below shoulder seam. Only the
most recently carned fourney to Excellence recognition may be
worn below patrol emblem or below the National Honor Patrol star.
 ■ Musician badge, if in band or drum corps, is worn ½ inch below
patrol emblem. 5 pis.

Left Sleeve

- ☐ Council shoulder emblem, unit numeral, and veteran unit bar are worn as shown sing up, and touching each other. On the official uniform shirt, the veteran unit bar (25, 50, 55, 60, 65, 70, 75, or 80 years) is positioned above and touching the troop numeral and in turn touching the council emblem. Spils.
 - On the official shirt, the badge of office is centered on the pocket, as shown. On the official uniform shirt, the badge of office is centered and touching the unit numeral, or centered 4 inches below the shoulder seam. On the official uniform shirt, the Trained Leader emblem is worn immediately below and in contact with the badge
- On the shirt, the Trained Leader emblem is centered as shown at the top of the pocket flap.
 - Den chief cord is worn over the left shoulder, under epaulet.

Right Pocket

| National or world jamboree insignia (only one) worn above the BSA program or corporate strip or the interpreter strip.
| Order of the Arrow lodge insignia worn on pocket flap.
| Temporary insignia worn centered on the pocket or hung from the button. Only one temporary insignia is worn at a time.
| Nameplate, if worn, is centered above the program or corporate strip and, if worn, above the interpreter strip. If worn, the jamboree emblem is worn above the interpreter strip. 5 pts.

Left Pocket

- Service stars are centered above the pocket, % inch from top point to top point and % inch from either the pocket or emboridered knots.


 Embroidered square knots are worn centered above the pocket in rows of three. 5 pts.
- Not more than five medals may be worn, pinned centered immediately
 above the pocket (extending over knots if both are worn).
 □ The order of wearing knots and medals is at the wearer's discretion;
 typically the medal or knot the wearer deems most important is worn. to the wearer's right.
- Badges of rank are worn centered on the pocket above the Arrow of Light Award, as shown.

 The World Crest emblem and Messengers of Peace ring are worn centered horizontally over the left pocket and vertically between the left shoulder seam and the top of the pocket.
